### ACROSS CALIFORNIA IN THE 2016-17 SCHOOL YEAR...

- 381,845 school suspensions occurred and 78,242 of them were for disruption/defiance.
- 472 schools used disruption/defiance in 50% or more of suspensions. 143 schools used it in 75% or more.
- **BLACK AND BROWN** boys were **54%** of disruption/defiance suspensions. They are only **28%** of CA students.


